To accommodate increased demand, St. Joseph's is building a new Patient Pavilion. Currently, many areas throughout the hospital are impacted by limited space. This is acutely evident in the Emergency Department, where patients being admitted sometimes have to wait before beds become available.

The new facility will increase bed capacity, with the majority of the 78 new beds in private rooms. Expanded Neonatal Intensive Care and Adult Intensive Care Units will be included. In recognition of the special needs of mothers and newborns, St. Joseph's will create a Maternal-Child Center of Excellence.

These are the areas where new life enters the world, where lives hanging in the balance are cared for by healing hands, and where grace is shared with those whose illnesses we cannot cure. This project touches the heart of the hospital where Miracles Happen.

Investing in New Life

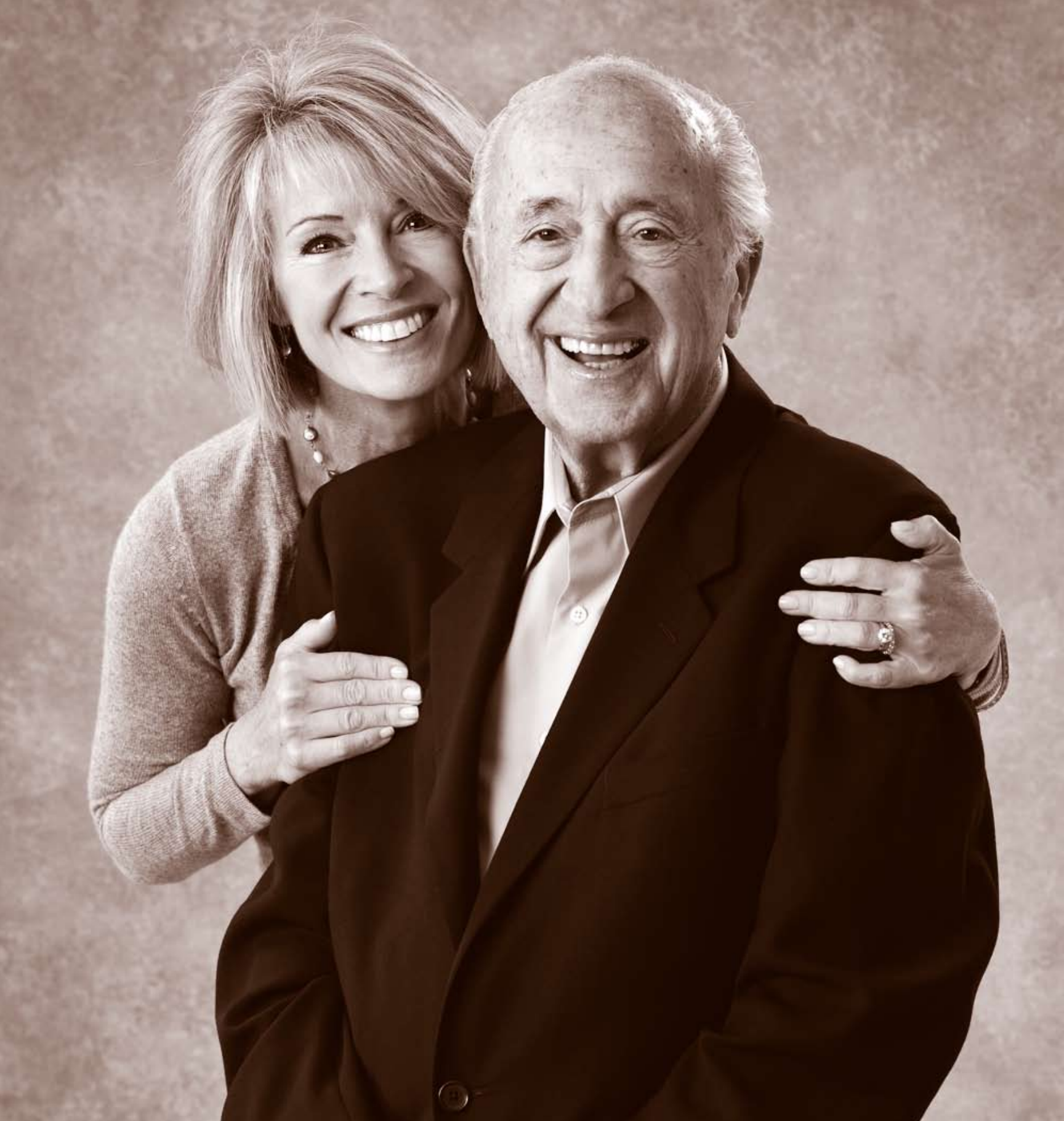

Susan McDonald's preterm labor was being controlled by medication. After a week of anticipation, Susan and Dr. Param Gill reviewed the risks and decided to deliver at just 35 weeks. Little Molly Lynn was on her way, five weeks premature.

While in the recovery room, Dr. Cheng said the baby was having problems breathing and needed to be moved into the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and intubated. "I was worried; we started saying our prayers," said Susan.

The NICU's high-tech medical care team helped Molly breathe. The compassion and expertise of a seasoned nursing and medical staff made all the difference to the family. "I was relieved and comforted both by how much the NICU nurses get the parents involved and how well they communicated with us... I felt reassured, she was in very capable hands. After this amazing experience at St. Joe's, I am both a grateful patient and a proud physician," said Susan.

Kappriel “Kappy” Nahigian is best known in Stockton for the former “Kappy’s Coffee Shop” across the street from the courthouse. For decades Kappy took care of hundreds of customers. Recently Kappy needed some special care of his own. The 86 year-old husband, father and grandfather had cardiac surgery in the summer of 2008 and spent eight days in St. Joseph’s Intensive Care Unit (ICU).

The ICU is a specialized unit that provides life support and continuous intensive monitoring for patients who are critically ill or recovering from surgery, and require a high level of complex care. The care in the ICU is provided by a multidisciplinary team of highly-skilled clinicians including physicians, registered nurses, respiratory therapists and clinical nurse specialists.

“Both of my parents are older and I worry so much about them, their health, independence and vitality,” said daughter Lori Rishwain. Having a loved one in the hospital can consume each day with worry and stress. “The ICU team took great care of my dad. The ICU nurses were fabulous; they eased my worries and looked out for me and my family, too! They communicated every step of the way.”

Everyday the ICU team provides life saving critical care, making Miracles Happen.

- 10 new ICU patient rooms
- A large waiting area

Investing in Time

When Sarah Solberg, R.N., joined St. Joseph's Emergency Room Staff 30 years ago, the ER had two nurses, one doctor and four beds. Today, the ER has grown to an Emergency Department with 24 beds serving an average of 120 patients a day.

St. Joseph's has the highest ambulance volume of any hospital in San Joaquin County and is frequently filled beyond capacity. What's more, the volume and acuity of patients continue to grow.

An overall hospital bed shortage sometimes causes patients to wait for an appropriate bed to become available. That exacerbates the congestion faced by patients who come to the ER. The situation quickly becomes a vicious cycle.

Thankfully, those concerns will be reduced with the completion of the new Patient Pavilion. Staff will be able to respond more quickly, reduce the waiting times, and admit people into inpatient beds in a more timely fashion. The community will be better served.

The community-based effort to raise \$20 million for major capital improvements is led jointly by Bob and Janet Kavanaugh and Kevin and Linda Sanguinetti.

As a retired bank president, and a seventeen year member of the St. Joseph's Community Board, Bob Kavanaugh offers advice to many about effective ways to invest their money in the growth of the community. Truth is, he sees contributions to the St. Joseph's new Patient Pavilion as just that, an Investment in Miracles. And that's something he, Janet, Kevin and Linda have dedicated their hearts and souls to achieve. "There's no question, St. Joseph's believes deeply in its mission, and in offering care to everyone, whether they can pay or not," said Bob.

President and CEO Donald J. Wiley explains, "If we build a new hospital to meet the growing needs, the price would range from \$2 million to \$2.5 million per bed. By adding a patient pavilion and other improvements to the existing hospital, St. Joseph's can expand bed capacity at less cost, while redesigning for more efficient use of space. There will be no waste. The return on investment will benefit the entire community."

COMMUNITY BENEFIT:

- Community benefit includes the cost of uncompensated health care and outreach programs like Mobile Mammography, CareVan and the Parish Nurse Program

\$20 MILLION CAMPAIGN FOR MAJOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS:

- The new Patient Pavilion is estimated to cost \$115 million and will be paid for through tax exempt borrowing, operating revenue, reserves and philanthropy
- A new \$4 million Linear Accelerator will improve treatment for cancer patients
- Upgrades estimated at \$3 million are slated for the Heart Catheterization Labs
