

Community Philanthropy Summit honors Suzanne Ledbetter.

In April, St. Joseph's Foundation of San Joaquin Board of Directors chair, Suzanne Ledbetter received the Outstanding Volunteer Fundraiser of the Year award at the Community Philanthropy Summit for San Joaquin County.

"It was an incredible honor to be acknowledged by our community for my efforts in fundraising for our local non-profits," she said. "It brings me great joy to share my passion for philanthropy and servitude with organizations like St. Joseph's Foundation and the Lodi Boys and Girls Club," said Suzanne.

She is one-of-a-kind in her creative and personable approach to philanthropy. It's made a difference across San Joaquin, and especially to St. Joseph's Foundation.

Giving out of generosity.

A skilled and compassionate radiation oncologist, Dr. Henry Wong's ability as a physician is eclipsed by only two things: his kindness and generosity. Sylvia supported Henry throughout his 37-year career at St. Joseph's, and is - in her own right - an outstanding and successful real estate agent/broker. Their extraordinary philanthropy is based on their philosophy of "paying back what they have been given."

The Wong's have established scholarships, hosted clinical summits for nurses, contributed to patient assistance programs, supported the construction of a new patient tower, expansion of the emergency department, and the development of a Graduate Medical Education program that trains physicians to meet our communities on-going physician shortage.

St. Joseph's Medical Center continues to grow and expand because of generous donors, like the Wong's, who have a vision and desire to ensure the best is available to all who live in our community.

Elevating care for critically ill patients.

Each day, 50 or more criticallyill patients are treated in one of four adult intensive care units at St. Joseph's.

Bedside ultrasound has become a valuable tool for physicians working in these critical care environments. It is now considered a standard of care for several invasive procedures -- central lines, paracentesis, and thoracentesis.

In fiscal year 2022, the foundation was able to provide two GE Venue Go ultrasound machines for our Intensive Care Units.

"Ultrasound is the future. This will help us have on-the-spot diagnosis, which means no delay in care for our patients while also providing the highest safety," said Dr. Annie Haji Datoo, a current internal medicine resident, "Equipment like this is what attracts the best doctors for our residency program."

Boosting patients' self-esteem.

St. Joseph's Behavioral Health Center has been in the community since 1974. We are committed to providing high-quality, affordable health care to patients and families in the greater Central Valley.

St. Joseph's comprehensive behavioral health services include a 35-bed inpatient hospital, day treatment, and outpatient services.

Thanks to philanthropy, our inpatient hospital established a structured self-care/grooming group to promote good personal hygiene and boost self-esteem in patients. The weekly schedule includes hands-on practice in the areas of nail care, hair care, skin care, facial care, meditation, light stretching, and more.

We recognize that good personal hygiene is an indication in patients' mental stability and preparedness to discharge.

A legacy of care.

The history of the Heart & Vascular Institute and Dr. Morrissey's legacy are woven together seamlessly. He joined the institute in 1972 and quickly became the chief of cardiothoracic surgery. A strong start to his career in Stockton, and the beginning of 50 years at St. Joseph's.

His specialties include cardiovascular, cardiothoracic and vascular surgery. A trio hard to find in one physician today. Over the last 50 years, Dr.

Morrissey has completed thousands of heart surgeries at St. Joseph's Medical Center. With each procedure, he continues to be at the cutting edge of technology – never wanting to stop learning or improving his craft.

Because of Dr. Morrissey's leadership, the Heart & Vascular Institute is a top program nationally, and the

first choice for heart patients in the Central Valley. It's also received many accolades, such as Designated STEMI Heart Attack Receiving Center, Designated Cardiac Center of Excellence, Designated Stroke Center, and in 2022 it received the CommonSpirit Health Transcatheter Aortic Valve Replacement (TAVR) Center of Excellence.

It's safe to say that building the heart institute is a lifetime of commitment and achievement for Dr. Morrissey. His credibility, reputation and innovation has put St. Joseph's on the map for cardiac care.

With this milestone, St. Joseph's Medical Center is renaming the heart institute, the Morrissey Family Heart & Vascular Institute. A legacy worth celebrating as we anticipate the next 50 years of heart medicine.

Nationally recognized for excellence.

This year was a highlight for our Graduate Medical Education (GME) program. St. Joseph's Medical Center was named a 2022 Fortune/ Merative 100 Top Hospital®. This honor comes with the recognition of being a top performing teaching hospital in the U.S. due to our successful GME program.

In 2018, St. Joseph's took a bold step to address our community's physician shortage and launched a physician resident training program. Today, our Graduate Medical Education Program has 137 physicians training in eight programs. In June 2022, we welcomed 60 new residents, including the inaugural class of residents to brand new programs in neurology and urology.

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Here at St. Joseph's Foundation, we helped pioneer this new era in San Joaquin Valley healthcare, and raised much needed funds for classrooms, high tech medical simulation training laboratories, and to support physician resident research. Philanthropy helped transform our dynamic medical center into a formidable teaching hospital. With this new recognition, we will have even more opportunities to make a difference.

GME Resident Highlight



Dr. Bugsch came to St. Joseph's in 2019 for residency and graduated in 2022. During his time as part of the emergency medicine program, he found his second family.

"The highlight during my residency was the people. St. Joseph's has great employees and what was unique to me was the involvement the CEO and CMO had with the residents. I'd walk down the hall and they would know my name," Dr. Bugsch said.

The GME program showed Dr. Bugsch the real need for physicians in the community, and he has now become an employee of St. Joseph's emergency department; staying local and living in Lodi with his wife who teaches in Lincoln Unified School District.

Personal service & peace of mind.

Thanks to generous donors, we were able to provide Lifeline with a new vehicle. Lifeline is an affordable medical alert service to help ensure independent living for seniors and peace of mind for their loved ones. Technical support 24 hours/day, 7 days/week, personal installation, and equipment service are provided by a dedicated program lead.


St. Joseph's Medical Center has offered this service since 1974 to help older adults and those with disabilities gain independence, dignity, and safety knowing that help will come with just a push of a button.

"I have been honored to support the community through the Lifeline program for over 20 years, and I am so grateful to the St. Joseph's Foundation of San Joaquin and its donors for the beautiful new vehicle to allow me the opportunity to continue serving seniors where they are for years to come," said Karen Vavzincak, lead Lifeline technician.

Lynn W. Cook Cancer Exercise Program.

St. Joseph's started a free cancer exercise research study about wearable technology, virtual, and home exercise. A cancer diagnosis and subsequent treatment can leave your body mentally and physically drained. Research has shown that physical activity can help lessen treatment side effects, increase energy and mood levels and restore physical function lost during treatment. In addition, there is evidence to show that physical activity can improve clinical outcomes.

Participants in the research received instruction from a health professional on how to complete a safe 12 week home exercise program. Philanthropy supported the cost to run the research, purchased the wearable technology for participants and provided a stipend for a University of the Pacific student to compile the research.



Employee gives back.

Teri Kozik, Ph.D. is the director of research for St. Joseph's Medical Center's Academic Affairs and Graduate Medical Education program. She's been a loyal employee giver for over a decade, a founding member of St. Joseph's Nurses Society, and recently joined our O'Connor Society.

"Giving back has always been something I have done, even the smallest of things can make such a difference in someone's life...and that's how I show gratitude I guess for all the blessings I have been given," Teri said.

Teri not only supports the foundation, but has been on the receiving end of generous gifts. Recently, Teri's department was approved for funding to lease ambulatory electrocardiographic monitoring equipment that can be used in the outpatient setting to monitor heart rhythms for up to two weeks on patients. Their current project is going to examine the arrhythmic burden in hospitalized patients discharged home from post-COVID-19 infection.

Teri's story shows how the foundation inspires employees to give in response to the impact they've experienced first hand.
